Staff & Professional Development

Over the years Kathy has served in every position on our staff, from Interlibrary Loans and Processing to Acting Director. She is the de facto Keeper of Memories for our organization and indelibly linked to the library in the minds of a large portion of our community. Kathy's warm and welcoming presence has set the tone for the library for four decades and we thank her for countless moments of grace and wisdom.
- We regret to announce the passing of library volunteer Linda Smith. We are glad to have known her for the brief time that she was a part of our library community.
- Jacob Cachia has joined us as a Summer Reading Club Student.
- We hope to have the **Indigenous Student: Summer Reading Club** position filled soon.
- Smithers Library staff (Melissa and Wendy) and Board members (Wally) presented sessions at various conferences in May and June including the BC Library Association, the BC Library Trustees Association, the Beyond Hope Conference for Northern BC Libraries, and a New Library Director Bootcamp.
- In addition to the many topics covered at the conferences above, recent staff **professional development** includes **Occupational First Aid Level 1** certification, a GLAM sector symposium and a BC Library Directors' Association meeting, as well as webinars on Unbundled **Legal Services** (family law) and **programming** for adults in their 20s and 30s.

Incidents:


An iPad was stolen in May. A window and a door sustained damage during the incident.

The purpose of this project was to foster inclusion and create space for discussions on what it means to belong, as well as to provide an apportunity for individuals to express themselves artistically.




- AFFNO showcased their mobile lending library of French books on our patio one afternoon.
- The 2nd annual **Pride Storytime** attracted **31 people** including families from Hazelton and one family encompassing three generations. This year's attendance was **triple** that of the first year.
- The library participated once again in the Smithers Pride Community Celebration, displaying our LGBTQA2S+ materials and sharing our tent with the Bulkley Valley Museum who were collecting local LGBTQA2S+oral history. 465 hamburgers and hotdogs were served, putting attendance at an estimated <u>500 people (!)</u> of all ages.





<u>156 people</u> attended a lecture on the Indian Act by cultural trainer **Bob Joseph** at the Della Herman Theatre. His book *21 Things You May Not Know About the Indian Act: Helping Canadians Make Reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples a Reality* is a Canadian bestseller and recently won a **BC & Yukon Book Prize**. Local booksellers Interior Stationery sold 40 copies at the presentation.

• Our first Repair Café (monthly, May through October) was a great success. Community members brought their belongings in need of repair to the Creation Station at 3866 Railway Ave. where local volunteers shared their skills and knowledge with their neighbours, teaching them how to fix the items and reducing waste in the process. Volunteers fixed clocks, chairs, a camp stove, three bicycles, electronics, a toaster, and sharpened people's tools. The "fix rate" was 100%! Many people, including families with children, came by to check it out saying they would return next month with items in need of repair. The volunteers were proud and happy, people with repaired items were delighted, and the volunteers' hands-on teaching increased the confidence of those learning new skills. Our first Facebook post about this program received 107 Likes and 64 Shares! This program is supported by the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako and Wetzin'Kwa.



- Magician Leif David returned to Walnut Park to delight over 200 children, punctuating his show with information about books, libraries and the Summer Reading Club. SD54 and the Northwest Library Federation supported this free event which was open to the entire community.
- Community members participated in **SKIN: The Game** to explore local incidents of racism. SKIN was a partnership event with the Smithers Bridging Committee, the Dze L K'ant Friendship Centre, the Province of British Columbia, courthouse Libraries BC and Wetzin'Kwa.



Impact Reports:

 A patron who immigrated to Smithers within the past year with very little English has passed her International English Language Testing System exam using textbooks borrowed through the library's interlibrary loan service. Her family has recently joined her in Smithers and she can now teach them English as well.

Services:

• The library has been inundated with requests to proctor exams since Coast Mountain College ceased to invigilate examinations for distance learners in January. We usually invigilate around 14 exams per year but now receive requests for about 6 per week. At present we are the only invigilators in Smithers, yet without separate rooms for quiet study or for noisy programs, and with limited staff hours, we cannot fully meet the demand for this service. Online courses are an increasingly popular, accessible and affordable way for people to pursue higher education and a career without needing to move away from their home community. The college is currently looking to hire an invigilator but in the meantime we are limited in our ability to deliver this service.
