Children's & Youth Programming

- Babytime, Toddlertime, and Storytime are going strong, while LEGO Thursdays have attracted up to 22 kids and adults per session.
- **Friday night teen and 'tween programs** funded by the **United Way** continue, featuring more plotting by the intrepid **Volunteens**. The group decided they wanted to have a Haunted Library for children to visit near Hallowe'en, and threw themselves into creating a spooky great time for **130 children and adults**, with games, activities, and a Ghost Walk for older kids. Thanks to the Volunteens, Sandra, the United Way and the Friends of the Library for extra snacks.
- Sandra and the Volunteens put together a very popular Kooky Kemistry Non-Instructional Day program in October. 74 kids and adults tried out various science experiments, with Volunteens demonstrating and displaying their projects.
