Children's & Youth Programming

- The perennially popular early literacy programs **Babytime, Toddlertime, and Storytime** are in full swing again for the fall.
- Friday night teen and 'tween programs funded by the United Way have resumed, featuring gaming, socializing, library services and snacks in a supportive youth-only environment.
- The **Volunteens** group, also funded by the **United Way**, is busy planning and assisting with **Non-Instructional Day activities**.
- The Volunteens have also cooked up a Haunted Library scheduled for the evening of October 28, with gentle fun for little ones in the children's room and creepy scares for older kids in the rest of the library. Visit if you dare! The Volunteens are so enthusiastic about developing and offering exciting free library programs for local kids that they requested permission to **fundraise** for supplies. All of us at the library are impressed with the motivation, creativity and confidence of these young people.
- The library partnered with the Association des francophones et francophiles du Nord-Ouest (**AFFNO**) to bring trilingual storyteller and musician **Jean-Pierre Makosso** to the community. Despite a small turnout due to multiple large community events happening at the same time, Jean-Pierre put on a spectacular show. Attendees sang, danced and drummed along as he shared stories from Africa.

- Dr. Sheila Smith and Dr. Peytra Davies presented an evening information session on pre- and post-natal mental health.

- The **Bulkley Valley Museum** partnered with the library to participate in **BC Culture Days**, creating a self-guided walking "Culture Hunt" in downtown Smithers. Participants followed clues to various buildings and monuments representing diverse aspects of our local culture.
