

# Library Report April 2019 Wendy Wright, Library Direct

The Library donated two bookcases, a table and several benches to the **Telkwa Reading Room**.

#### **Programs & Events**

- Samantha Bosscher (Primary Care Nurse, Smithers Community Health Services) and Chris Blois (HIV Educator, Positive Living North) presented <u>Opioid Crisis: What Can</u> <u>You Do?</u>. Participants learned to recognize the signs of an opioid overdose and received hands-on training in how to respond, including administering Naloxone. Wetzin'kwa Community Forest Corp. sponsored the event.
- Valerie Laub presented <u>SKIN: The Game</u> in partnership with the <u>Smithers Bridging</u> Committee, OARH (Organizing Against Racism & Hate), the <u>Dze L K'ant Friendship</u> Centre, Courthouse Libraries BC, the <u>Province of BC</u>, and <u>Wetzin'kwa Community Forest Corporation</u>. Participants recreated locally reported incidents of racism, assuming the roles of perpetrator, target and bystander to discuss possible motivations and responses.
- <u>March Break Pyjama Day</u> -- Children and their caregivers were invited to visit the Library in their PJs one afternoon to decorate a pillowcase. Much to our surprise, <u>91</u> people took us up on the offer! We'll know for next year... (and be well-stocked with pillowcases and snacks).

• The <u>Science Extravaganza</u> Non-Instructional Day Program was a huge success, with 6 scientists, 8 Volunteens assisting, and <u>93</u> attendees. Children learned about wolves, rocks, anatomy, electrical circuits, landforms, the history of the Earth, and more. Kids explored the popular augmented reality sandbox, and one group even built their own radio and that managed to pick up The Moose FM. Thanks to the Smithers Exploration Group, Eclipse Geomatic, wildlife biologist Bob Hayes, the Society for Canadian Women in Science and Technology (SCWIST), and the Library VolunTeens.
