Outreach

- Library staff and VolunTeens dressed as classic storybook characters for the Fall Fair Parade, handing out 1800 bookmarks provided by the Friends of the Smithers Library.
- The **New Library-Gallery** Fundraising Committee hosted an **information booth at the Fall Fair**, speaking with over 130 people and answering questions. Fairgoers expressed a great deal of interest in using the new multipurpose community spaces for meetings, conferences, and even weddings.
- Jacob and Noel brought the library's tent to the **Farmers' Market** for Kids' Day with a Storytime on stage and a seed activity.
- **125 people** attended the annual **Campfire Cookout & Singalong** in Riverside Park. Many new families with babies and toddlers were present. The diversity of attendees and level of audience singalong participation was the highest yet.
- Approximately 700 people attended National Indigenous Peoples Day celebrations at the Dze
 L K'ant Hall on June 21. Hundreds of people browsed the library's display of Indigenous books
 and DVDs inside the hall while Sandra, Jacob and volunteers did face painting for 144
 children outside in our tent. This was the biggest turnout yet at the annual celebration, with
 noticeably more schoolchildren in attendance.


Reports & funding



Events:



The program featured local scientists leading kids through activities, answering questions and showcasing a selection of aquatic insects.
