# National Day for Truth & Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day:

Thanks to funding from the **LawMatters** program of **Courthouse Libraries BC**, the library was able to **give away 103 books for all ages about residential schools** on September 30. People arrived early to ensure they would receive a book, and many visitors were families with small children. One Indigenous man said he came to find books to teach his children about residential schools so that he can tell them what he went through. Everyone was appreciative and many people indicated that they would spend part of the holiday reading their new books. ## **Book Lovers' Night out (BLNO):**

The October BLNO was held at The Aspen Riverhouse for the first time since the pandemic began. This months' selection was *How to Stop Time* by Matt Haig. Eight people attended, including two first-timers, and four additional people borrowed copies from the Book Club Set. Three more people sent regrets with intentions to come next time, and there have been at least three inquiries from people new to the community who are interested in attending.
